What are feathers used for? They're more than just plumage and hat decorations. They are an integral part of *Our Feathered Friends*, a travelling exhibition from Ottawa's Canadian Museum of Nature.

The exhibition 'takes off' at the Centre for Conservation from April 30 to September 5, 2011.

Discover the keys to bird watching by learning what birds are, how to identify them and where feathers grow. This exhibit includes a scavenger hunt, craft and activity station to engage all ages in bird life.

Forest, field and water birds can be seen throughout Ball's Falls Conservation Area. Discover these hidden gems in our forest with the new bird sleuthing skills you can learn during your visit.

Soar to great heights as a birdwatcher by visiting *Our Feathered Friends* and or take part in our special programs in conjunction with this exhibit. Included with the exhibit is a self-guided craft and activity area, a scavenger hunt in the hallway and the National Film Board documentary the Great Blue Heron will be shown.

- Sat. April 30 Our Feathered Friends Travelling Exhibit from the Canadian Museum of Nature opens.
- Sunday May 1, 9 a.m.-noon, Bird Banding, Join James Smith of the Haldimand Bird Observatory for a morning of bird banding. We will be catching birds (unharmd) to band them and study them as they fly through the conservation area.
- Sat. May 14, 10 a.m.—4 p.m. International Migratory Bird Day, Visit the displays by local naturalist clubs and enjoy discovering more about birds. John Black and Kayo Roy will be signing and selling their blockbuster book *Niagara Birds*. From 9—10 a.m., join Rob Kuret, Superintendent of Ball's Falls for a Warbler Hike and see many of our migrant visitors. At 10:00 a.m. Kim Frohlich, NPCA ecologist will be giving a 45 minute general bird hike. You might be caught by one of our banders in the park and learn about the value and importance if you find a banded bird. Bird Studies Canada will also have a display from 12-4. Bird Kingdom will present a 30-45 minute live show about exotic birds at 11, 12, 1 and 2. You can have your photo taken with one of the talking birds.
- Sat. May 14, 12:30-3:30p.m. Chimney Swift Workshop, 12:30-3:30, pre-registration required for those committing to assist with this Bird Studies Canada project. The Chimney Swift has been assessed nationally as endangered by the federal Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC). Status: threatened provincially and designated threatened nationally. This presentation is free to anyone who can assist in this research.
- May 28, 1-2 p.m. Great Bird Quiz and Singing Songs, improve your bird listening skill by trying out this activity.

June

- June 10, 10a.m.-11 p.m. Let's Fly, how to look for birds in flight and more sleuthing techniques to discover our bird friends and take a short guided hike to spot bluebirds around the centre for conservation.
- June 11, 10 a.m.—3p.m. Bye Bye Birdy, discover Birds through arts and crafts, story-telling and birdsongs.
- June 18, 10 a.m.—3p.m. Niagara Woodcarvers Association, bird carving demonstration
- June 25, 1-2 p.m. Bird Body Parts, clue to Bird identification by looking at beaks, wings tails and even colour. This also helps connect birds to their habitats.

Chimney Swift

The Chimney Swift

Chimney Swifts are a Threatened species in Canada, and over the past 40 years have experienced an overall population decline of 95%. There are several suspected causes for this rapid and alarming decline, including a reduction in essential food and habitat resources. Bird Studies Canada has recently initiated Ontario Swift-Watch, a project that aims to identify important nest and roost sites, areas of concentration and occupancy, and trends in numbers over time; and will also facilitate the

preparation of appropriate Chimney Swift recovery strategies. Participants will be citizen science members assisting with the identification and observation of Chimney Swifts in Niagara.

Our presenter on May 14 is Elisabeth van Stam of Bird Studies Canada. Although a lifelong bird-watcher, Elisabeth has recently joined the ranks of professional bird biologists. Elisabeth is also a bat specialist, performing environmental assessments for wind farm

sites. Elisabeth holds a M. Sc. Ecology and Evolution, and has worked as an Ontario Region Project Biologist for Bird Studies Canada over the past three years. She has been integral in the development of Ontario SwiftWatch, a monitoring based program that uses "Citizen Scientists" to identify causes for the decline in Canada's Chimney Swift population. Elisabeth misses the bats, but is comforted by the fact that Chimney Swifts are essentially bats that have feathers and lay eggs!
